- August 2019 major mills announce shutdowns and curtailments due to high stumpage rates and poor market conditions
- -Sept 2019 GBM meet Doug Donaldson
- -Oct 10 2019 "Interior Fibre Policy review Process" Our association submits 17 recommendations
- -Oct 25 2019 Media event Enderby attended by Association members and local politicians
- -March 2020 Governments implement Covid fighting measures implemented setting in motion the fastest rise in commodity lumber ever
- -March 2021 Both LTBI and BC Wood apply for supply chain resiliency funding (covid recovery strategy)
- All the above provided inspiration to some strategies both short term and Long term strategies in purchasing fibre

- Be less selective
- Be creative
- Pay fast pay fairly
- Make it easy and better for your supplier!
- Use the employment ratio
- Discuss the low environmental impact
- Give project details
- Get owner/ decisionmakers on side
- Host your own media/ Informative event or similar



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Log and timber Employment statistics

Employment Ratio of our Industry:

100 cubic meters of logs / 1 Fulltime annual position approximately 100 companies in our sector of the forest Industry

on average 10 positions each =1000 jobs total

Approximately 1 out of every 33 jobs of interior forestry

(processing jobs?)

fibre consumption = approx. 1000 cubic meters each company total fibre use approx. 100 000 cubic meters Industry total Annual fibre harvest in interior BC estimated at 50 million cubic Meters

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Log and timber sector consumption .002% of interior harvest.

That means 1/500 of the interior harvest to create 3% of processing jobs!

Learn the Term Employment ratio

- Why calculate <u>Employment Ratio</u> fibre use in terms jobs creation instead of Value Added?
- It is a better gauge of the direct economic benefits to local communities
- "Volume", "Gross sales" and "Value added" do not effectively measure the local economic impact
- Speaking in terms of "Employment Ratio" will help bring back the forest value to smaller regional forest based communities, Its an attention getter!
- We all need to speak in terms of Jobs in our community it's the Ace up your sleeve!
