Workshop Roundtable Topics

1. Fibre Acquisition: Fibre Challenges and Long-term Supply Chain Solutions Peter Sperlich of Canadian Pride Log and Timber Products

The current boom in building materials has in most cases doubled the prices of commodity wood products and impacted significantly the value and availability of raw logs. Peter will be providing first-hand insights and observations, as well as give some examples and tools of value for others to work with. This presentation is also intended to provide perspective of where the value-added wood sectors will need to go to meet future challenges.

Breakout Room 1 – Key Questions and Objectives

- What are some short-term and long-term solutions for our industry to continue to access fibre?
- What can we do as individual companies and as an Industry Association to keep our operations running?

2. Energy Carbon Policy: Where we are and where it is going Kelly Marciniw, Pan-Abode International

The BC LTBIA board has been working with the BC government to recognize the environmental and low-carbon benefits surrounding predominantly log homes and structures. Currently log homes are lumped in with all other types of structures with regards to energy efficiency in building codes as there isn't a lifecycle or low embodied carbon requirement. Kelly will be discussing what "low carbon" actually is and how it impacts the lifecycle of buildings and our members' products, as well as discussing the different metrics for the BC Energy Step Code – air tightness (ACH), mechanical energy use intensity (MEUI), and thermal energy demand intensity (TEDI).

Breakout Room 2 – Key Questions and Objectives

- What defines or makes a home a "log home"?
- While still showing increased energy efficiency gains between steps, what metric targets are reasonable given the other low-carbon benefits of log buildings?
- What issues do you foresee, particularly with blower tests; have you had them done, and if so, what are your tips and tricks?
